Fourth Annual Maritime DX Forum

Michael Brickell VE3TKI

I attended the 4th Annual Maritime DX Forum, which was held in Halifax, Nova Scotia, on August 4, 2007. The Forum, which I heard about it at the Dayton Hamvention last year, was sponsored by the Halifax Amateur Radio

Club. While staying in the KOA campground in Dayton, a number of us spent a very entertaining evening chatting with Dick Grantham, VE1AI, who told us about the Forum. My wife Margo and I drove down to Halifax in 3

days, I went to the Forum on Saturday, and we left on Sunday for a 2 day drive home.

The main attraction of the forum for me was the opportunity to hear a presentation about the BS7H Scarborough Reef Dxpedition, which had taken place earlier in the year. (Scarborough Reef is the #1 most wanted DXCC country. It is literally 4 rocks in the South China Sea. Check out the BS7H web site for some fantastic photos from the 2007 dxpedition – the link is:<http://www.scarboroughreef.com>).

The Forum was held in a community centre in the town of Upper Tantallon at the head of St. Margaret's Bay, just outside Halifax.

The first of 5 presentations over the day was on BS7H, and was given by Joe Blackwell AA4NN, who was on the expedition, (which gave us lots of opportunity to inwardly whine and twist in our chairs with envy...). This was an excellent presentation, with lots of pictures. The second was given by Fred VE1FA, and his wife Helen VA1YL, both ex VE2s, originally from the West Island Amateur Radio Club on the Island of Montreal. The topic was "The Art of Mounting Island Dxpeditions". The West Island ARC is known for undertaking expeditions to IOTA islands. This was very interesting and provided lots of tips on how to properly organize island expeditions.

The first of three presentations after lunch (which was provided as part of the \$35 cost) was by Scott Wood VE1QD (the event organizer), on his trip to Antarctica. He had set up and operated as "maritime mobile" on the ship, a small icebreaker. This was interesting to me because we are planning to go to Antarctica in 2009 for

our 40th anniversary. There were lots of Antarctic pictures, but not a lot of radio content, in this one. The next presentation was by Jose VA3CPJ from Ottawa on "Why do Mariners become Radio Amateurs". He talked about some of the packet radio equipment he has used while sailing. Finally Jim Fisher VE1JF talked very briefly (too briefly I thought) about the proposed RAC HF band plan changes.

The event was well organized. They provided coffee, muffins, and lunch, and we paid extra for dinner. There was a bluegrass band during/after dinner. I stayed for part of it, but not being a bluegrass fan, left part way through.

There were 43 attendees, of which 3 were VE3s, and 2 VY2s, the rest VE1s.

I talked to the Halifax ARC president, Brian Allen VE1AZD, quite a lot about club matters and hamfests, and found that their club and ours they have much the same issues. Scott, the Forum organizer, told me that they had hoped for a few more attendees. They paid hotel and travel expenses for Joe Blackwell who came from South Carolina I think.

There was someone checking QSL cards for DXCC credit on hand during the event.

The next one is going to be August 22- 24, 2008 to commemorate the Halifax club's 75th anniversary next year.

This was an event well worth attending. I would go again another year, depending on topics of the presentations.

The Roving Reporter

The Roving Reporter interviewed Arnold Griffith (9Y4NG) over the summer. Arnold lives in Trinidad, but has a daughter living in Mississauga, and has joined the club as he is in Mississauga fairly often. During his visit in June, Arnold attended a club meeting, and at that meeting he generously donated a deviation meter to the club. The meter will be used for adjusting repeater levels.

9Y4NG

RR: Arnold, how did you become a member of the club?

AG: Well, once it became apparent that my daughter and her husband were going to live here permanently, I checked on the web to see if there were

any amateur radio clubs in Mississauga. I then contacted Lorne VE3CXT and Michael VE3TKI, who brought me to a club meeting. After several visits, I took membership in 2004.

RR: What do you do in Trinidad?

AG: In 1976 I started an electronics business. We now supply, service and

maintain two-way radio communications equipment to various clients throughout Trinidad and Tobago, mainly oil, business and industry-related companies.

RR: How did you become interested in amateur radio?

AG: My dad was an electronics engineer with his own electronics business, so I grew up seeing electronic equipment and parts. When I was 14 or 15, in 1956, my dad and I built a 7 or 9-tube 5-band AM radio together. When we finished the radio I was tuning around and happened across the 40 meter band. I did not really know much about what was on the airwaves, but I heard a local voice calling CQ CQ W4CCZ. The caller was Ralph Samlal (VP4LR). The prefix VP4 was used before Trinidad and Tobago had gained independence in 1962. This was the very first time that I had heard a local non-professional voice on radio. This was very exciting to me, especially as the caller's address was very close to where I lived at the time, only about 3 to 4 miles away.

My dad then explained to me what amateur radio was all about, and we visited Ralph. Subsequently, I became friends with Ralph, who was running AM only (no SSB then!), using a Globescout transmitter, and a Hallicrafter SX 28 receiver into a 66 ft long wire. Not many hams had sophisticated commercial antennas then.

At around age 20 I was working for an electronics company, and finally sat the exam in Port of Spain. I was the youngest person taking the exam. At that time, having a ham licence was a pretty prestigious thing, and mainly older people had licences. In Trinidad, at that time, it was acceptable to be on the air using a licensed ham operator's call sign with their permission, as long as you said you were a fixed portable. So, for a while I operated on the air, legitimately using the call sign VP4LQ portable. I also operated as part of our local FAP (Fire, Ambulance and Police) net, again using the same call sign with the licensee's permission. So, in essence, I have been a ham since 1955.

RR: Did you have to learn CW in order to get your licence?

AG: Yes, I had to pass a written and oral test, and then demonstrate that I could send and receive at 13 wpm. In those days, there was no CD or tape tutor available to me, so my dad bought me an Elizabethan Bandbox tape recorder with 4 speeds on it. I learned the Morse Code, and, using an English shortwave news broadcasting station sending CW at 22wpm, I taped it on the high speed setting, then played it back on the slower speeds until I no longer needed the recorder. Also, I used to copy CW from weak stations in between the commercial broadcasting stations on 40m. Later, I taught CW classes to other people, sometimes in groups of no less than 6 persons at a time.

RR: What interests you most in the hobby?

AG: I used to do both CW and voice. I have never been much into DX contests. What I enjoy most is meeting other people from all around the world on the air, telling them about Trinidad and Tobago, the culture, lifestyle, environment, and in general, what our country has to offer. Many people have come to Trinidad and Tobago as a result of this, for example, yachtsmen. I used to get 30-40 QSL cards every day. At one time so many, that the postman who delivered door to door asked me what kind of business I was running!

RR: Tell me about your station at home.

AG: Well, initially I did a lot of home brewed stuff. My first antenna as a new ham was a wire 66 ft long, tied between a tree and my house, and fed with 75 ohm twisted telephone wire. I used a 60 watt bulb as a dummy load to make sure the transmitter was putting out power. Later on I started buying commercial equipment.

When I moved to my current QTH 22 years ago, I was looking for a location on a hill or by the sea. Well I got the sea but not the hill. Now I have several towers: one 70 feet high, with pretty much an individual antenna for each transceiver

monitoring a different frequency. For radios, I have a couple of Kenwood TS 440s, a TS 940, an ICOM 706, and a Yaesu FT-847. I also have a packet station using an ICOM 22H, a Kenwood 731 dual band VHF/UHF radio, and a Motorola GM300 radio running an echolink system. Over the years I have built HF, VHF and UHF Yagis and verticals, and a number of other antennas, including the Arrow dual band J pole built and used by a number of MARC members. I also have a Cushcraft tri-bander with a 40m add-on kit, and an 80m inverted V on the tower.

My latest addition is a complete weather station used to forecast weather conditions and wind direction; and, on the drawing board in the not too distant future is "moon bounce." I have already secured four stacked 15-element Yagis for this purpose.

My station has been set up to accommodate three operating positions, designed with emergency community service in mind. It is equipped with emergency backup systems in the event of power failures.

RR: Do you belong to a local club?

AG: Yes, I am a member of the Trinidad and Tobago Amateur Radio Society (TTARS). Now that I am semi-retired, I am trying to encourage more of our local hams, particularly in the south of Trinidad, to get involved, and not just attend annual general meetings, but rather, to get together informally just to chat, like you do here in Mississauga.

As part of my ham activities as a member of TTARS, I'm the National Emergency Management Coordinator. We have a national organization like your ARES here. We work with government organizations to ensure that

we are prepared for any disaster (e.g. hurricanes). We conduct regular practice simulations in order to stay prepared. The Trinidad and Tobago government has recently awarded millions of dollars for the purchase of electronic communications equipment for emergency disaster preparedness.

RR: How many amateur radio operators are there in Trinidad and Tobago?

AG: On the island, about 300-400. Of these, about 100 are active members of TTARS.
